## CASTLES IN THE AREA







Greenan Castle, a 16th-century tower house in South Ayrshire, Scotland, lies about 2.5 miles southwest of Ayr. Perched atop a sea cliff, its origins trace back to a promontory fort transformed into a motte-and-bailey during the 12th century. In the 15th century, the Lords of the Isles constructed a tower house, eventually acquired by the Kennedy family. Today, it stands as a testament to Scotland's rich history, captivating visitors with its rugged beauty and storied past.

Dunure Castle, a ruin for over three centuries, was once the stronghold of the influential Kennedy family, Earls of Cassilis. While today Culzean Castle, nearby along the coast, is more closely associated with the Kennedys, Dunure Castle held primacy for several centuries from the 1200s. Built on a rocky outcrop overlooking the Firth of Clyde, its origins likely date back to that era. Over time, the castle expanded with additional structures, including a kitchen, chapel, great hall, and prison, reflecting the family's prosperity and stature. Notably, Dunure Castle witnessed historical events, like a 1429 meeting between James I of Scotland and the Lord of the Isles, ending in violence, and hosting Mary Queen of Scots in 1563 during one of her royal progressions.

Nestled on a 100ft high mound near Dundonald village, Dundonald Castle dominates the landscape. While its appearance suggests artifice, the crags on its west side hint at nature's hand. Built around the time of Robert II's reign in 1371, it was his favored residence until his death in 1390. Yet, despite its historical significance, Dundonald Castle's austere grandeur belies any notions of comfort. Dr. Johnson, in 1773, found it unfit for royalty. Ravaged by wars and time, its legacy lives on amidst its stark, monumental ruins.

### WALKS FROM HERE



#### The Blue Bonnet Trail

Embark on a captivating self-guided historical walking trail marked by 23 Blue Bonnet signs spanning 31 locations from Ayr town center to Alloway, revealing the town's rich heritage as you traverse its streets and parks. Access the experience through the "Ayr Through The Ages" app under "Historical Tours." Trace the footsteps of Robert Burns' legendary character, Tam o' Shanter, from his renowned poem published in 1750. Begin your journey from multiple starting points, tailoring the length and duration to your preferences. Navigate the trails with ease, guided by the Blue Bonnet signs, and stay mindful of urban traffic and golf course hazards along the way.

#### The Lang Scots Mile

Prior to the 18th century's standardization of weights and measures, the term "mile" in Scotland varied in distance, often exceeding English miles. Robert Burns immortalized this discrepancy in his poem "Tam o' Shanter." The "Measured Scots Mile" spans between Miller's Folly and Blackburn Car Park, characterized by flat terrain and wheelchair accessibility. En route, enjoy panoramic vistas of the Firth of Clyde, Arran, Kintyre, and the Cumbraes. A midway point features a children's play park, enhancing the experience for families. This scenic trail not only offers historical insight but also invites exploration amidst Scotland's picturesque landscapes.

### A DAY AT THE RACES





Ayr Racecourse stands as Scotland's sole Grade 1 track, renowned for hosting premier horse racing events throughout the year, encompassing both flat racing and jumps.

Set amidst picturesque surroundings, it is the esteemed venue for the Coral Scottish Grand National Festival in April and the William Hill Ayr Gold Cup Festival in September. In 2018, Ayr Racecourse boasted a record-breaking 37 fixtures, many accompanied by live entertainment. Beyond racing, it plays host to various organized events.

With roots tracing back to 1576, the racecourse relocated to its present site in 1907, later undergoing a £20 million transformation in 2006. Today, the Princess Royal Exhibition, Banqueting, and Conference Centre offer luxurious amenities across four floors, including the Ayrshire Suite, champagne gardens, fine dining establishments, corporate boxes, and chic bars. Indulge in a variety of culinary delights at Silks Café Bistro and Colours outlets.

With 32 thrilling fixtures annually, featuring live entertainment and Family Racedays where under 18s enjoy free admission, Ayr Racecourse promises unparalleled excitement for all.

## DAY TRIPS TO THE ISLANDS



#### Isle of Arran

A short ferry ride across the Firth of Clyde leads to the captivating island of Arran, boasting ancient castles, breathtaking scenery, and abundant wildlife. Lochranza, a mere 15 miles from Brodick's ferry terminal, offers a delightful blend of these attractions, making it an ideal day trip destination for families or nature enthusiasts alike.

#### Island of Great Cumbrae

A 10 minute ferry trip from Largs takes you to the Island of great Cumbrae and the town of Millport. A haven for wildlife, there are over 120 species of birds and seals which can be spotted in the bay. Millport boasts safe beaches for kids and offers a variety of indoor and outdoor amusements as well as Europe's smallest Cathedral.. The perfect place to hire a bike and cycle round the island.

#### Isle of Bute

Beautiful Bute is one of the most accessible Scottish islands, just a short ferry ride across the Firth of Clyde.

It is a short trip from Wemyss Bay to the Victoriana meets art deco-style resort of Rothesay, with its palm trees and promenade. Attractions include Rothesay Castle, the stately home at nearby Mount Stuart, and some of the country's best toilets.

For such a compact island, Bute has some extraordinarily varied landscapes. From the lush, fertile and rolling hills of the island's heart to the craggy, heather-covered moorlands of the north and the delightful sandy beaches around the coastline, the island is a haven for walking, cycling, fishing and wildlife.

## CROY (ELECTRIC) BRAE



Located on the A719 south of Dunure, between Drumshrang and Knoweside in South Ayrshire, the Electric Brae presents a mesmerising spectacle: vehicles appear to defy gravity as they roll uphill, sparking curiosity and wonder among visitors.

This optical illusion, known as a gravity hill, has intrigued generations, captivating the imagination with its seemingly supernatural allure. Despite its name, "Electric," which originated from earlier misconceptions regarding electric or magnetic forces, the phenomenon is purely visual in nature. The term "brae," derived from Scots, denotes a hill-slope or brow, emphasizing the landscape's crucial role in crafting this enchanting illusion.

As visitors traverse the Electric Brae, they are enveloped in a sense of mystery, reminding us of nature's ability to confound and challenge our perceptions.

# BELLEISLE PARK & ROZELLE MUSEUM & GALLERIES



Spanning 12 hectares south of Ayr along the Clyde coast, Belleisle Park boasts expansive parkland, diverse woodlands, a serene deer park, and a charming walled garden adorned with formal plantings, ponds, and rockeries. Among its attractions are play areas, manicured lawns, and two 18 hole golf courses. A meticulously restored Victorian conservatory and garden grace the landscape, while the Visitor Hub hosts dynamic exhibitions highlighting the park's heritage and wildlife. The versatile Exhibition Area accommodates both permanent and rotating displays, featuring wall-mounted and freestanding exhibits. Completing the experience are a cozy coffee shop and a well-stocked golf emporium.

Located on Ayr's southern side, Rozelle Park boasts a storied estate featuring the original 1760s Mansion House, The Maclaurin Art Gallery, and the inviting Rozelle Tea Room.
